Merry Christmas!

Have you ever looked at the birth of Jesus from Mary's perspective? She, more than anyone, knew that this baby was the Son of God, yet there were some unwelcome surprises at the time of His birth:

1. Travel

The need to travel to Bethlehem at the time of His birth would have been disturbing. It was about 130 kilometers and was normally a 4day trip. Any woman due to have a baby values home and security at such a time. Did she wonder, Why has God allowed these circumstances? Why now? Or did she see it as God intervening to bring about His purposes to have the Messiah born in Bethlehem?

2. Poor Accomodation

They arrived after a long trip to find there was no room for them. That's enough to make a pregnant woman panic! She bore her child in an unfamiliar, crude setting and had no place but a feeding trough in which to lay God's Son. Why? God's Son was not given a high class entry into this world, nor even an ordinary one. It was a humble beginning. Did Mary wonder why God allowed this for His Son? Did she feel forgotten by God? Was God making a point?

3. Loneliness

Where were the grandparents, the relatives and friends who usually come to celebrate a birth? Mary and Joseph were far from home.

God sometimes requires hard things of His children, but He has His own unique ways of comforting us and meeting our needs in a way that is far beyond our expectations.

Though it appears He deliberately chose to have His Son born in unusually poor circumstances, He honored Him by sending a company of angels to announce His birth. The most amazing birth announcement ever was made to some of the most lowly people—shepherds! They came and told Mary and Joseph what they had seen and heard, and if the parents had any questions about the hardship that God had allowed, they must have vanished when the shepherds told them their story.

God doesn't always do what we expect Him to, but many times He does far better!
