Saskatoon Hispanic Church

Eduardo and Laura Guinez were born in Chile, where they met and married. It was a time of political unrest, and when some of Laura's family were taken to concentration camps, they decided to come to Canada. They arrived in Edmonton in 1976 with 2 boys, 4 and 5 years old. A daughter, Cassandra, was born in Canada. They loved Canada from the start, and Laura's family have since also come.

Eduardo met Pastor Jorge Vallejos of the Edmonton Hispanic Church and other Christians through soccer. Laura had been ill with congenital hip problems from birth, and she went to the Church for the first time in a wheelchair. She found help and friendships at church and soon she and Eduardo became Christians. Gradually Eduardo shared in the ministry of the church and he and Laura studied and graduated from a program through Goshen College.

In the year 2000 they went to Saskatoon to

explore the possibility of a Hispanic Church plant. They looked for Spanishspeaking people and for a door to open without success. Then they happened to go past the Pleasant Hill Mennonite Church, and Eduardo stopped in to speak to Pastor Dave Peters. Here he found the help he needed and soon arrangements were made for them to use the facility for services. The first service was held in November 2002.

For several years he worked in Edmonton and they traveled to Saskatoon every weekend. When Henry Hamm from the Pleasant Hill Church offered him work with the freedom to take time for ministry as needed, they moved to Saskatoon.
